#### Letter from the Commission

#### Dear neighbors and friends of the Preserve

We've had a particularly busy year maintaining and restoring the Wetherill Nature Preserve (WNP) this year. Our typical annual maintenance budget is \$35,000. With support from the Towns of Yarrow and Hunts Point along with the generous support of the residents and friends of the Preserve, we've been able to address our annual maintenance needs. Here's a recap of the activities over the last year:

Trail flooding remediation. Built up and raised the Lake and Marsh trails to thwart perpetual flooding. Hazardous trees removal. Cut down the dying cottonwoods threatening people and properties. Invasive species removal. Removed poison hemlock, purple loosestrife, and clinging tree ivy. Small animal/bird habitat construction. Created eight habitat havens for wildlife using tree-fall debris.



Davey Tree Co. was hired to remediate numerous dying cottonwood trees to ensure visitor safety and prevent nearby property damage.

#### Funding for long-term sustainability of WNP

In the past, we've relied heavily on a few volunteers to address the majority of our maintenance needs, but increasingly we must use contracted manpower to tackle the larger, dangerous, or technical projects. Tree hazard projects mentioned above have depleted our reserves, which hinders future projects to ensure the stability and long-term health of the Preserve.

#### Capital campaign for WNP special projects

The Commission has identified **\$100,000** in special projects which includes hiring professional help. Keep reading this newsletter to learn more about the priorities and goals of this capital campaign and how you might help.

We've raised over \$15,000 for the special projects fund since the August kick-off and our goal is to raise **\$40,000 by year end** 2024, but we'll continue to campaign until we reach our goal. Please consider donating to *both* the **Annual Fund** and the **Special Projects Fund**. You'll find donation instructions in this newsletter. #### Natural safe havens for wildlife in the Preserve

Habitat havens within the Preserve are essential for wildlife because they provide safe spaces for species to thrive without the threats of urbanization, pollution, and human interference. These protected areas offer shelter, helping wildlife to maintain healthy populations and ecosystems. Since Preserves also serve as crucial breeding grounds, habitat havens help with the continuation of species and biodiversity, which is fundamental to the overall health of our planet.

#### What you might see in the Preserve

The Preserve is a haven for wildlife enthusiasts. Visitors may encounter a variety of species, including deer grazing and busy beavers. Bird- watchers will delight in spotting bald eagles soaring overhead and songbirds flitting among the trees. The preserve's diverse ecosystems provide habitats for smaller mammals like raccoons and squirrels, as well as an array of amphibians and reptiles. WNP offers a unique opportunity to experience the rich biodiversity of the Pacific Northwest.

# Capital campaign priorities and goals for 2025-26

## **Special Projects Fund**

The WNP Commission identified \$100,000 of capital projects to address in 2025-26.

- Restore damaged trails and habitat (focused on the Lake and Marsh trails). Approximately three-quarters of the Special Projects Fund will go towards this priority.
- Update the WNP Management Plan with a new focus on ecosystem resilience and visitor experience. This plan was last updated in 2017.
- Update signage, replace rotting benches, and fence the maintenance area.

# What's the difference between the WNP Special Projects Fund and the Annual Fund?


**The Annual Fund** (target is \$35,000) is used for regular maintenance, limited tree control and invasives removal. The Towns of Yarrow Point and Hunts Point each contribute \$10,000 annually. In 2024, the WNP Commission spent an *additional \$53,000* from reserves to remove and clean up dead or dying poplars and cottonwoods. The rest of our budget comes from generous neighbors like you.

**The Special Projects Fund** is intended to address critical issues outside of normal maintenance in our 16-acre urban forest and wetland. These projects will better prepare the Preserve for the next decade of increasing weather damage, flooding, and visitors.
